Dr Yoshiko NAKANO awarded the Japanese Foreign Minister's Commendation for 2021

Japanese Studies; 17 Nov, 2021

Dr. Yoshiko NAKANO, Director and Associate Professor, Department of Japanese Studies, SMLC, has been awarded the Japanese Foreign Minister's Commendation 2021 for her contribution to the promotion of mutual understanding between Japan and Hong Kong.

Dr. Nakano joined the Department of Japanese Studies at HKU in 2000. Her research focuses on intercultural communication and the study of globalisation of Japanese products and services. She has championed experiential learning by providing students with opportunities to join academic exchange programs at prestigious Japanese universities, and through initiatives such as the "HKU–UTokyo Joint Summer Program," which ran from 2013 to 2018. She has been proactive in creating opportunities for students to interact with the wider Japanese community in Hong Kong, and establish bridges between the two. Examples of her efforts include the setting up of internships at the local branches of Japanese companies.

Dr Nakano has played an important role within the Japanese community and was made the first female director of the Hongkong Japanese Club in 2007. She has spearheaded and contributed to various initiatives for the Club, including, most recently, a research project related to the Japanese graves in the Hong Kong Cemetery.

Dr. Nakano was presented with the Foreign Minister's Commendation at an official ceremony on November 17.

About the Award

First introduced in 1984, the
Japanese Foreign Minister's
Commendations are awarded to
individuals and groups who have
distinguished themselves in
international fields, and is an
acknowledgement of their
outstanding contributions to the
promotion of friendship between
Japan and other countries and
regions.

This year, the Commendations will be awarded to 177 individuals and 41 groups (22 individuals and 5 groups reside in Japan, and 155 individuals and 36 groups reside overseas).

Dr. Janet BORLAND becomes First Scholar of Japan to Win Prestigious International Book Prize

Dr. Janet BORLAND, Assistant Professor in the Department of Japanese Studies, won the 2020 Grace Abbott Book Prize for *Earthquake Children: Building Resilience from the Ruins of Tokyo* (Cambridge, MA: Harvard University Asia Center, 2020). The prize is awarded annually by the Society for the History of Children and Youth for the best book published in English on the history of children, childhood, or youth (broadly construed). Dr. Borland received the prize in an online ceremony at the biennial conference in Galway held in July. She is the first scholar of Japan to win this prestigious international book prize.

"By mining a remarkable archive of materials generated before and after the earthquake, Dr. Borland demonstrates that children played a critical role in the development of Japan's distinctive approach to disaster-preparedness," noted the prize committee. "It provides a model for how historians might analyze and incorporate sources produced by children into their scholarship." Members of the prize committee were "particularly impressed" with Dr. Borland's "expansive and creative archive, and her nuanced analysis of the diverse material children generated about the disaster, including narratives, images, and poems." The committee likewise praised the "book's graceful narrative rendered in clear and accessible prose, along with its helpful methodological discussions." Both features, they agreed, "will make it valuable to scholars and students in many fields."

In a further honour, the Premier of New South Wales announced in August that Earthquake Children had been shortlisted for Australia's most prestigious history prize: the General History Prize, which is part of the 2021 NSW Premier's History Awards. Dr. Borland's book was one of three finalists for this Prize.





The Sixth Global Creative Industries Conference

Global Creative Industries, Conference & Exhibition, 06-07 Nov 2021 (Sat-Sun)

The Sixth Global Creative Industries Conference "Artists, Markets, and Survival" held from the 6th to 7th November concluded successfully. The conference was organized by the Global Creative Industries Programme and supported by the Education Foundation for Asian and African Studies. The conference was one of the major events that marked the 10th anniversary of the Global Creative Industries Programme. This year, around fifty scholars, researchers, practitioners, postgraduate and undergraduate students from all disciplines participated in this hybrid event.

The conference invited three distinguished speakers to give special lectures on art administration, NFTs and the digital art market in Hong Kong. They were Dr. David TSUI, the executive director of Hong Kong Dance Company; Mr. Roger CHUNG, the founder and CEO of Maximus Consulting (Hong Kong) Ltd; and Mr. Heiman NG, the director of Digital Art Fair Asia. Dr. Karl Ian Cheng CHUA, Dr. Marco PELLITTERI, and Dr. Heung-wah WONG also presented their new book "Japanese Animation in Asia: Transnational Industry, Audiences, and Success" at the book launch roundtable. The next Global Creative Industries conference will be held in Tokyo in 2022.





The NCNHNL database


Expensive Taste, 2021

Latin America in the aftermath of Covid-19: What is next?

European Studies and American Studies; 26 May, 2021

This event was the first of the Focus on Latin America Seminar Series and was centred on 3 Latin American countries, the Covid-19 situation and also other internal issues affecting nation. Dr Anna Bautista (American Studies HKU) moderated the event and introduced each speaker. Dr Bárbara Fernández-Melleda (Latin American Studies, HKU) talked about Chilean politics, the recent protests leading to the establishment of a Constitutional Assembly, and the vaccination programme in the country. Dr Marcelo Thompson (Faculty of Law, HKU) discussed the situation in Brazil under Jair Bolsonaro's government and delved into misinformation regarding the management of the pandemic there. Dr Roland Voqt (European Studies, HKU) spoke about Colombia and the challenges the country faces also after several rounds of protests and the attempt at reorganizing the country given the Covid situation. In all three countries the common denominator was precariousness. Despite governmental attempts at mitigating the effects of the pandemic and prolonged lockdowns through bonuses, vouchers and other policies, thousands if not millions of Latin Americans could not access this aid as their work is informal and takes place in the streets. It has been calculated that over 20 million people in Latin America have fallen below the poverty line during 2020. It remains to be seen how the region will cope with this new scenario in the years to come.

In the speech contest, four HKU students participated, and Miss PUK Sum Yin from the Korean Studies programme won the second prize with a 5000hkd-worth voucher and Korean Airline tickets to Korea.


Poetry Reading Session with Japanese university students







Dr. Paul S.K. CHA was awarded over HKD 568,000 in GRF funding for a project entitled 'Building a Transnational Protestant Network: the Korean War, Protestant ecumenism and protest movements'.

Dr. Bárbara FERNÁNDEZ MELLEDA

(American Studies)

Dr. Bárbara FERNÁNDEZ MELLEDA was awarded funding from the Louis Cha Fund for a project entitled 'Poets as Friends: images of Chile in AI Qing's poetry'. This research will examine a small corpus of Ai Qing's poems inspired in the Chilean landscape, composed during a visit to Pablo Neruda's house in Isla Negra in 1954, when the Chilean poet celebrated his 50th birthday. Ai and Neruda's friendship had started a few years earlier when Neruda visited China as an envoy for the Lenin Peace Prize.

And on June 18, 2021, Dr. Bárbara Fernández-Melleda was invited as the plenary speaker of the "Gender and Social Movements" International Conference organized by the Gender Research Centre, CUHK. Titled with 'Lessons from Chilean Feminist Collective "Las Tesis" during the 2019 Revolt: The Viralization of "A Rapist in your Path", the sharing was about her work and cogent analysis on the gender and the movement erupted in Chile since 2019.

Dr. Su Yun KIM


(Korean Studies)

Dr. Su Yun KIM has won the Cross-national Interdisciplinary Research Grant at the Harvard-Yenching Institute with a project title "Wars and Revolution in (E)motion: Inter-regional Cultural Exchanges in Cold War Asia." As the PI for this one-year group project, Dr. Kim will collaborate with group members in Hong Kong, Japan, and Vietnam from April 2022 to March 2023. Dr. Kim will also host an international conference at HKU in March 2023 for this project.

Dr. Daniel POCH

(Japanese Studies)

On March 9, 2021, Dr. Daniel Poch was invited by a podcast Interview at the Japanese Studies channel of the *New Books Network* about his book *Licentious Fictions: Ninjō and the Nineteenth-Century Japanese Novel* (Columbia University Press, 2020). In the book, Dr. Daniel Poch investigates the significance of ninjō in defining the literary modernity of nineteenth-century Japan and explores how cultural anxieties about the power of literature in mediating emotions and desire shaped Japanese narrative from the late Edo through the Meiji period. Poch argues that the Meiji novel, instead of superseding earlier discourses and narrative practices surrounding ninjō, complicated them by integrating them into new cultural and literary concepts. Dr. John WONG was awarded the Luce East Asia Fellowship at the National Humanities Center in Durham, NC and will spend most of the 2021-2022 in the US. He will work on a project entitled 'Hong Kong Takes Flight: commercial aviation and the making of Hong Kong, 1930s–1998'. In addition, he received funding from the Louis Cha Fund to host a conference at HKU on Chinese business history.

According to the HKU website, up to five scholarships of the value of HK\$10,000 each shall be awarded annually to second year or above (non-final year) full-time local Bachelor of Arts students, based on academic merit (GPA 3.3 or above) and other attributes such as demonstrated leadership abilities, active participation in community service, mastery in areas such as sports, music or artistic pursuits or other non-academic achievements.



Ignatius G.D. SUGLO receives the Laura Bassi Scholarship, his paper "Visualizing Africa in Chinese Propaganda Posters 1950–1980" was also published by Journal of Asian and African Studies.

Allison DU Shichen was among the second set of noteworthy applicants for the Laura Bassi Scholarship. Also, DU gave a presentation entitled "Making the Hometown of Qipao" in the "The Influence of Heritage on Tourism" panel for the ICAS (International Convention of Asia Scholars) 12 conference on August 25, 2021. The conference was held online in lieu of the original arrangement to convene in Kyoto, Japan.

Raymond LOK Yiu Hong recently graduated from the University of Hong Kong with a Bachelor of Arts, majoring in English Studies and Linguistics and minoring in Thai. He has spent his undergraduate years developing his interest and his knowledge in Thai, in addition to two overseas exchanges to universities in Thailand and the UK for Thai language and culture courses.
